Preparation for the tournament

Preparation for the tournament commenced as early as May 2022. National Organizing Committee had series of meetings with all stakeholders including Sports tutors, ministry officials and APHTIU executive.

Pre – Championship Training

The pre - championship training was organized at Uganda Health Institute Management – Mulago, over 82 participants attended and it was facilitated by trainers from across different federations. The training was to build capacity of sports tutors to be able to manage these games. The participants felt that the training activities were truly entertaining and educative.

Regional tournaments

All the 14 regions across the country organized their regional tournament; however the regional committee had a challenge of bringing private institutions on board to participate in these games and funding for the tournament was a challenge.

Officiating of games

There were few formal complaints raised about officiation during the tournament. One concerned alleged allowing of a goal by a referee of hand ball that was not scored on a justification that it had hit a goal post and entered in the last minute of the game. The other concerned a referee's failure to call for fouls in instances of dangerous play.

There were however several verbal complaints on officiation from coaches across the touch lines. While this is expected in football, some coaches however went to the extreme by verbally exchanging with referees in an aggressive manner in the field when calls were made against them. And in a few instances, the referees also retorted back either during matches or after the final whistles.

Fields of play

The tournament was hosted at St. Leo's Kyegobe grounds, St Peter ground, Seminary ground, Canon appolo ground, Bukwali ground and buhinga ground. The proximity of the fields to each other was ideal for management of all field logistics during the tournament. However, it involved transporting students. It also rained everyday throughout the tournament which delayed some activities.

Meals for Officials

Breakfast, Lunch and super were provided to five team officials from every Institution that participated in the championship. There was a complaint of delay in serving the meals. All participants interviewed felt that meals provisions were excellent.

Meals and accommodation for Students

Students were provided with breakfast, lunch and super, however the quality of food provided to students was not good for the first three days, this was because most schools were just reporting and chefs did not have exact number of students to prepare meals for.

Tournament Rules

All tournament rules were formally written and given out to teams together with the tournament program. The tournament was thus conducted under these rules.

Awards

The best participants received medals in athletics, mind games, Woodball and the best teams in ball games received trophies

Major Achievements

a. The introduction of online registration eased the work of screening participants on arrival to the championship, this was done successfully.

- b. The tournament organizers did not register any indiscipline case among the students.
- c. Regional team qualification made the tournament more competitive compared to the previous championships.
- d. The number of petitions reduced with the new verification system.
- e. The new verification system reduced non bonifide students from participating in the championship.
- f. The accommodation facilities for both girls and boys were enough for all the participants.
- g. The championship was graced by State Minister of Education & Sports Hon. Ogwang.
- h. The committee created a watsapp platform for all sports tutors all over the country; this helped to close the communication gap.
- i. All the fourteen regions successfully conducted regional tournament.

Challenges

- a. The quality of food provided for students was poor. There is a need to improve the quality of food.
- b. It rained throughout the tournament, which made roads impassable in transporting the teams to field of play.
- c. There was a problem with the fixture of football and a huge number of matches on the third day were a challenge to most teams.
- d. There was a change of dates from the original closing date which made officials fix so many matches to match the closing date.
- e. Verbal disagreements and exchanges between coaches and referees during matches was also a challenge in a few matches.
- f. Current economic crisis in the country affected so many private institutions from participating in both the regional and national championship.
- g. The APHTIU executive overrides the role of the National Organizing Committee during the championship.
- h. Team managers did not take time to read the tournament rules. This was seen during the championship.
- i. Teams did not manage time properly; some missed their matches and walked over.
- j. Some officiating officials favour some teams when officiating these matches.
- k. Coaches are not professionally trained they end up fighting the referees.
- 1. Institutions have players who have played in the tournament for over five years.

- m. Sports tutors tend to ignore technical review meetings and that's where the committee gets feedback and communicates to the team managers.
- n. Schools don't declare the actual number of students in the accounts department which affect in preparation of meals.
- o. Regional coordinators did not submit their regional tournament report in time.
- p. There is increased form of forgery on the participation cards this is unethical, evil, and is an outright form of corruption.
- q. Some schools did not register their teams online and they brought their students to participate in the championship.
- r. Transporting officials became a big challenge to the committee during the championship.

Recommendations

- i. There is a need to set years a player is supposed to participate in the tournament.
- ii. There is a need to strengthen capacity building of sports tutors in managing these games through trainings.
- iii.There is a need to purchase a van for the committee to ease transportation of officials during the championship.
- iv. The APHTIU should supervise the work of the national committee but not interfering with their work during the championship.
- v. The teams in first, second, and third place should be awarded with medals.
- vi.The committee should work together with APHTIU to find potential partners who can sponsor the championship.
- vii. Institutions that refuse to participate in both regional and national championship should be strongly punished.
- viii. Teams that have been banned from championship should receive a formal written letter stating the years of ban.
 - ix. There is a need to introduce games that cater for disabled students so that they are not left out.
 - x. The committee needs to purchase movable small public address system to help in communication during technical review meetings.
 - xi. The term for National organizing committee expired and need arrangement to elect a new committee.
